









After higher studies in law and finance, Mr. Abdellatif Jouahri worked, between 1962 and 1978, within Bank Al-Maghrib where he held several management positions including those of Inspection, Human Resources, Bank Control and Credit.

In 1978, he was appointed Minister Delegate to the Prime Minister in charge of public enterprise reform before heading the Department of Finance between 1981 and 1986.

From 1986 to 1995, Mr. Jouahri was Chairman and Managing Director of the Banque Marocaine du Commerce Extérieur (BMCE) and President of the Professional Group of Banks of Morocco (GPBM). Between 1995 and 2002, he worked as an international consultant, particularly with organizations such as the IMF, the IDB and the FADES. Subsequently, between 2002 and 2003, he initiated the reform of the regime of the Moroccan Interprofessional Pension Fund (CIMR), of which he was Chairman and CEO for the second time after a first mandate between 1991 and 1995.

He was appointed by His Majesty the King in April 2003 as Wali of Bank Al-Maghrib.

In parallel with his functions at the Central Bank, Mr. Jouahri chairs the following bodies: Supervisory Commission of the Caisse de Dépôt et de Gestion, Casablanca Finance City Authority (CFCA), Council of Administrators of Al-Akhawayn University, Moroccan Foundation for financial education (FMEF), the Moroccan Observatory of SMEs and the Moroccan Center for Banking Mediation (CMMB). He is also a member of the Steering Committee of the Royal Institute of Strategic Studies (since November 2007), of the Economic, Social and Environmental Council (since February 2011) as well as of the Higher Council of Education, Training and Scientific Research (since July 2014).

Mr. Jouahri was also a member of the Consultative Commission on Regionalization (2010) and a member of the High Authority for National Dialogue on Justice Reform (2012).

In June 2018, Mr. Jouahri was designated, by His Majesty Mohammed VI, as a member of the Board of Directors of the Mohammed V Foundation for Solidarity and, in May 2019, President of the evaluation body of the Authority responsible for privatization.

Mr. Abdellatif Jouahri was born on June 10, 1939, in Fez.











Ryad Mezzour, appointed on October 7, 2021 by His Majesty King Mohammed VI, may God assist him, Minister of Industry and Commerce, was born in 1971 in Rabat.

A graduate of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich in 1996, Mr. Ryad Mezzour began his professional career in Switzerland as a Research & Development engineer within the ABB group, before joining Deloitte as a strategy consultant.

Returning to Morocco in 2003, Mr. Ryad Mezzour successively held the positions of general director of Budget Maroc, director of the Société des Fonderies de Plomb de Zellidja and general director of Suzuki Maroc.

Mr. Ryad Mezzour has held the position of director of the office of the President of the Economic, Social and Environmental Council since 2013, before joining, in 2019, the Ministry of Industry, Trade, Green and Digital Economy as as chief of staff of Minister Moulay Hafid Elalamy.


Active in the economic and social sector, Mr. Ryad Mezzour was vice-president of the Green Economy Commission at the Confédération Générale des Entreprises du Maroc (CGEM) between 2012 and 2015 and is a member of the board of several non-profit institutions.































Mohamed Methqal, Ambassador – Director General of the Moroccan International Cooperation Agency. He is a graduate Engineer in Communication Systems with a Master's thesis in Financial Mathematics from the Ecole Polytechnique Fédérale de Lausanne (EPFL) and holds an MBA in Management from the College of Engineers in Paris and a Certificate in Entrepreneurship from Babson College in the United States. Mr. Methqal began his career in scientific research in 2000 in Switzerland where he was a research assistant at the Ecole Polytechnique Fédérale de Lausanne. Subsequently, he continued his career in France in strategy, management and organization consulting with international consulting firms based in Paris. During this period, he carried out several consulting missions in Europe and Morocco in the public and private sector, particularly with large companies, banks and insurance companies.

In January 2010, Mr. Methqal joined the office of the Minister of Economy and Finance as advisor to the Minister for two years. Then, Mr. Methqal supported companies and investors in their strategic projects in Morocco and sub-Saharan Africa. From October 2013, Mr. Methqal held the position of special advisor to the Minister of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation for three years, where he was responsible for new economic diplomacy, cooperation and international development. He also served between February and December 2016 as chief of staff to the President of COP22. Furthermore, Mr. Methqal co-founded two innovative companies in the development of interactive tables in 2003, and in the management of clinical trials in North Africa in 2006. Mr. Methqal is the winner of the NETS prize rewarding the fifteen best young entrepreneurs in Switzerland in 2003.

Ambassador of Chad to Morocco



He participated in all phases of negotiations between the State of Chad and the oil consortium. Appointed deputy secretary general of the Presidency of the Republic, he was also entrusted with the oil file. He was in turn at CEMAC, commissioner in charge of monetary policies, then commissioner in charge of the department of infrastructure and sustainable development.


Born on May 16, 1961 in Casablanca, Mr. Ahmed Reda Chami was appointed on December 3, 2018 by His Majesty King Mohammed VI, President of the Economic, Social and Environmental Council (CESE). Mr. Chami graduated from Centrale Paris (1985) and holds an MBA from the Anderson School (UCLA). Between 2016 and 2019, he was ambassador of the Kingdom of Morocco to the European Union, in Brussels. Previously, Mr. Chami was Minister of Industry, Trade and New Technologies from 2007 to 2011, then deputy for the city of Fez, from 2011 to 2016. In 2019, Mr. Chami was elected by his peers, President of UCESA. Mr. Chami has held several positions, in insurance and in new technologies, notably within the multinational Microsoft, in Morocco and internationally.





















Yacouba Katile, is the 6th President of CESEC. He was elected in July 2021 in a context of political-institutional crisis that Mali is going through, marked, in particular, by the questioning of the usefulness of this consultative assembly in the institutional architecture. Today, this trend is reversed thanks to the new dynamic driven by CESEC.

Since September 20, 2021, he has been an Officer of the National Order of Mali. He was a senior Customs official and has a professional and activist background. He was appointed head of the National Union of Workers of Mali (UNTM), the largest trade union center in the country in March 2014. He was a member of the UEMOA Labor and Social Dialogue Council (CTDS). between 2014 and 2020; Chairman of the organizing committee of the UCESA General Assembly held in Bamako on October 11, 2017; Vice-President of the 5th term of the consultative body in charge of the ad hoc committee on political and institutional reforms of the Council; He served as Vice-President of the Organization of African Trade Union Unity (OUSA).





















































































Mohamed Camara, is Professor and Chair of the Department of African Studies at Howard University. Before joining the Howard faculty, Dr. Camara taught at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Florida, where he served as director of the McNair Scholars Program, chair of the Faculty Senate, and associate vice president for academics.

In 2009, he received Embry-Riddle's Outstanding Teacher of the Year Award. Previously, Mr. Camara was a lecturer and associate president of the philosophy department at the University of Conakry, Guinea; journalist for the national radio and television network of Guinea; correspondent for Radio France International; speechwriter for the press office of the presidency of the Republic of Guinea; and president of the university press of Conakry.





















Fathallah Oualalou, is an economist and has been a professor at the Mohammed V University of Rabat and other higher education establishments in Morocco, as well as an associate professor in several foreign universities. He is the author of numerous works and articles in the fields of economic theory, financial economics, international economic relations, the economies of the Maghreb countries, the Arab world and the Euro-Mediterranean zone. He was also president of the Association of Moroccan Economists and the Union of Arab Economists.

His political activism began with the creation, in the 1960s, of the USFP - formerly UNFP, where he held multiple leadership positions until 2015. During his studies, he served as president of the National Union of Moroccan students (UNEM) and was one of the leaders of the Confederation of Maghreb Students. Since 1976, he has been elected several times to the Municipal Council of Rabat and, since 1977, to the Moroccan Parliament. From 1984 to 1998, he was parliamentary leader in the Chamber of Deputies. He was then appointed Minister of Economy and Finance from March 1998 to October 2007, then elected mayor of Rabat from 2009 to 2015.











Hachim El Ayoubi, Principal expert, Economic, Social and Environmental Council (CESE), Morocco.

He is a state engineer in Agronomy, graduated from IAV in Rabat (Morocco) and ENSAR (Rennes, France). Currently, he works as a senior expert at the EESC.
